If you are entering a Black & White Challenge quilt in the show, please remember it needs to be turned in to Julie no later than January 9th so we can vote on it at the January Guild meeting.
- **Pick up Opportunity Quilt tickets**—please help us save on postage by getting yours at the meeting. Tickets and stubs are due at the January Guild meeting.
- **Sign up to work** at the show—use the online signup at your leisure or at Guild meetings. Online: www.SignUpGenius.com/go/4090E4BAEAE2DA6FA7-sbqq1. If you know you cannot work the weekend of the show, consider helping to sell tickets as our quilt travels around Southern California. SBQG Kingdom of Quilted Creatures!

What fun it is to see so many joining us at the SBQG Zoo, Several Hometown Cats and Dogs blocks were revealed last month. We look forward to seeing the farm animal blocks from the Heartland of America that you have crafted. All the monthly Creature patterns both pieced and appliqued are available. Samples for ways to incorporate the creature patterns into quilted items or a whole quilt will also be shared. The Animal Kingdom has a participation incentive when you join the SBQG Zoo. Each time you bring back completed zoo animal quilt blocks, there is a special something in the Zoo Keepers Box just for you.

October’s Animals are Forest Fauna from Europe

What kinds of mammals are found on the European continent? How about Eurasian Beavers, Balkan Brown Bears, Iberian Lynxes, Red Squirrels, and Granada Hares? All pieced patterns are the animal face. The applique patterns are the whole animal. Stop by our table and see the samples for all the individual monthly blocks

UFQ Jungle (Un Finished Quilts) – There is still plenty of time to enroll in the UFQ Jungle challenge. The guild is inspiring you to dig out six -6- UFQs (or more) and bring the list to the meeting. 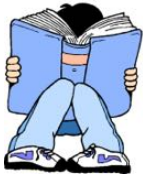

On behalf of Julie and CASA, thank you so much for the amazing group of quilts and books turned in at the September meeting! We had 14 quilts and more. Many thanks to Melanie Dreike, Carolee Shugraf, Donna Bowker, Lucia Petrarca (2 quilts), Pam Overton (2 quilts, 5 receiving blankets and 4 baby blankets), Karen Rakita, Beverly Mulligan, Jane Pavlina, Judy Platys (former member), Nadine Kirk (3 quilts with pillowcases), Dottie Daybell (3 knitted stockings) and June Stewart (2 baby blankets). Wow! You are really out-doing yourselves, and your work is much appreciated by CASA and the foster children. Please keep up the great work!

CASA has advised that their program has expanded to assist kids up to 21 years old. These young adults were previously finished with the program at 18, and were out on their own. Now they are getting more guidance from CASA in getting their lives going. 1. Moda Bake Shop's pattern for the Pixie Sticks quilt uses a very simple 8" block. What you think is the block, isn't the block! As Margaret Schucker taught me years ago, when you analyze a quilt, look at a corner. The pattern shows four possible layouts, but I'm sure you can find even more.

2. WW BOM Kimberley Einmo's variation on a Double Friendship Star is a pretty 12" block which is easy to make. She has instructions, and a link to a PDF, here:

I like the look of her smaller star on top of a larger one. You can substitute red for her neon green, and possibly put gold in the center, in place of the teal. Or keep the teal! You'd need 24 blocks, set 4 x 6, with added 3" borders on the ends. Or 15 blocks, set 3 x 5 with 3" sashing, and 3" outer borders on all sides. The stars could be all the same, or scrappy.

3. Ann at Fret Not Yourself posted a link to this article, with many photos, about Eli Leon, the Bay Area collector of African-American quilts, who was a speaker at SBQG years ago. Sadly, he's "alive but not in our world", as the article says, and there was an estate sale at his home a few months ago.
