April 18, 2018 – **Shirley McGuire** will bring her expertise to share on the topic of “Felting, Reclamation, & Deconstructing Wool for Applique.” She will have three small projects for class participants to work on during the class to help us learn her techniques. **Class fee is \$50.00**, with a **kit fee of \$20** payable the day of the workshop. The kit includes all materials needed to complete the three small projects presented in class.

Presidents Thank you . . .

It is time to be thinking about saying thank you to our two wonderful co-presidents, Alexandra Tsubota and Donna Bowker. It is supposed to be a surprise, oh well, I'm sure when they see your lovely blocks they will be surprised. We will have some samples at the workshop table.

Alexandra's blocks

She would like to have leaves of all sorts. They can be appliquéd, pieced, paper pieced or any other way you would like to make the blocks. She would like them in sizes of 6 1/2, 9 1/2 or 12 1/2 inches. Background should be beige, cream, tan or white.

Donna's blocks

She would like Amish style nine patch blocks that are six and a half inches. Any color solid or tone-on-tone in the corners and center, black Kona cotton for the other four squares.



2018-04 Findings April

1. I love the movement in this quilt!

A limited palette. Simple Broken Dishes blocks alternating with string blocks. Varying the angles of the strings makes all the difference. She credited Beth for the idea:

2. WW BOM I have only a photo this month, but I've written instructions for you. On this post, scroll about half way down to find a Quilt of Valor top made by quilters in Eastern Missouri:

It alternates 16-patch blocks with what I'll call half-square-in-a-square blocks (only two corners lopped off). The blocks probably finish to 8". For the 16-patches, cut 2.5" squares of red, white and blue. Alternate white squares with reds and blues. It would be easy to piece the blocks from 2.5" strips, sew 4 strips lengthwise and slice into 2.5" sections. For the half-square-in-a-squares, cut 8.5" squares of white, and cut 4.5" squares of red and blue to make triangle corners on two diagonally opposite corners of the white squares. You'll get some largish scraps from those blocks, but you can sew an extra line of stitching and get HSTs to "reserve for another use," as recipes say. Set all the 16-patch blocks with a white square at the upper left, and all the half-square-in-a-squares with their triangles at lower left and upper right. Make 30 of each kind of block, set 6 x 10, to get a quilt 48" x 80". They think the pattern is called Road to St. Louis; I think not!

I'd guess the rectangles finish to 4" x 8", or maybe 3" x 6". No diamond is complete; they appear and disappear.

Community Services has so much important information to share, more information will be on the next page!

At the March Guild meeting we were happy to share the most recent quilts for fire survivors made by our Guild members: the second queen size quilt (hearts on white) for the Santa Rosa fire survivors (hot off the long arm machine from Kellie Rollo Fireman), and three Perkiomen quilts for the Thomas Fire (Ventura/Santa Barbara Counties) fire survivors (long arm quilted by Matt Randall). There is one more Perkiomen top that is ready to be quilted. We anticipate that these quilts and another dozen pillowcases will be delivered before the April Guild meeting.

Many thanks go to our Guild members from recipients of pillowcases and quilts, including the children who received pillowcases in the Santa Rosa area. Our total deliveries are:

Over 220 pillowcases, 9 quilts (including two queen-size), and 5 crocheted baby blankets to the Santa Rosa fire victims; and

Six Perkiomen Valley quilts with coordinating pillowcases, and two quilt "kits", including tops, backing, binding and batting, to the Thomas (Ventura) fire victims.

PHILANTHROPY NOMINATIONS – APRIL DEADLINE. Please note that the close of the April guild meeting is the deadline to nominate local charities for philanthropy awards from the Guild budget.

The Philanthropy Nomination form is posted in the Member's Only section of our website and is attached to this newsletter. As required by our Guild bylaws, nominated charities must be IRS-designated non-profit organizations. Members who wish to submit a nomination must provide the completed Philanthropy Nomination form **and** provide **either of the following with their form**: a copy of the organization's IRS letter of designation or their tax ID number.

In order to be accepted for consideration, the completed Philanthropy Nomination form **must also include the following information**, which is highlighted on the form:

The name of a contact at the organization, their address, telephone, and e-mail address (if possible). This information is used by the Guild treasurer in reporting Guild donations to the IRS and the state.
A description of what the charity does for the community and how donated funds will be used.

Nominated charities are not restricted exclusively to the South Bay area, but we do encourage members to consider charities that support our local communities and those where our members reside.

We will compile a list of the nominated charity organizations, along with a description of their activities, for review by the Board and inclusion in the May newsletter. The membership will vote on the nominated charities at the May Guild meeting, and the voting results will be presented to the Board at the June Board meeting. At that time, the Board will review the voting results and determine which charity(ies) will receive funds from the Guild budget. If multiple charities are selected, the philanthropy budget (as determined at the May Board and Guild meetings) will be allocated by the Board based on the voting preferences of the Guild. The Board's recommendation will be presented to the Guild at the June meeting and the Guild will vote on the final award amounts.

It's April and time for our annual DCFS Project. This program supports the foster children in the care of DCFS. These children, because of domestic violence or unsafe conditions, often leave their homes with just the clothes on their backs. Our contributions help improves the quality of life for these children and families.

Last year when we turned in the items that were collected, they were most appreciative. In particular they were happy to see over \$700 in gift cards. In recent years their biggest need has been for pre-teen and teen children. So, we thought that this year we would focus on gift cards from Target, Kohl's, Walmart, Ralphs, Vons, or ???. 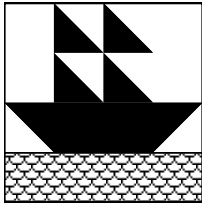
