## Upcoming Workshops & Speakers

### *Melanie Dreike & Sue Glass*

Our last speaker for the current guild year is *Lisa Walton*. Her program topic will be "*Leap & the Net Will Appear.*" Lisa started with traditional techniques over 25 years ago, but she says, "I quickly developed the urge to break the rules". She has a fascination with dyeing and surface design and now concentrates on more "serendipitous and experimental pieces". "I have a passion for sharing my knowledge and teaching", she says. She has received many awards and published a book and two eBook's. Lisa is currently the president of Studio Art Quilt Associates – SAQA.com – an international non-profit dedicated to promoting the art quilt and the artists who create them. Lisa lives in Sydney, Australia with her husband, Peter.

Since we are talking about the end of our **guild** year, remember that we will thank our co-presidents by presenting them with quilt blocks. We want to present these blocks at the June meeting, so all blocks need to be turned in no later than our May meeting. You may turn your blocks in to Sue at the workshop table.

As a reminder . . .

#### Alexandra's blocks

Alex would like to have leaves of all sorts. They can be appliqued, pieced, paper pieced, embroidered, or any other way you would like to make the blocks. She would like them in sizes of 6 1/2, 9 1/2 or 12 1/2 inches. Background should be beige, cream, tan or white. Please be sure to keep the edges of your leaves well within the ¼ seam allowance around the block so that they are not cut off when Alex incorporates them into her quilt.

#### Donna's blocks

Donna would like Amish style nine patch blocks that are six and a half inches. Any color solid or tone-on-tone in the corners and center, black Kona cotton for the other four squares. Call Sue if you have a question about the colored fabric or need black Kona cotton, and she will mail a strip or two to you.

In Mel’s class, we will unlock the fun and intrigue of Interleave quilts. This workshop will reveal all the secrets behind creating the illusion of curves and transparency. Best of all, these interleaves are assembled using a quilt-as-you-go technique. Stop by Sue’s table and see the beautiful class sample. **Class Fee is \$50 for SBQG members, \$60 for everyone else. No kit fee.**



**October 17<sup>th</sup>, 2018 – Tina Curran** will teach “Whimsical Gardens.” This workshop involves making a pieced background, fussy cutting flowers (from floral fabrics), adding cut stems and then fusing down, & raw edge appliquéing, all the flower heads and stems to the background. The class project finishes at about 24" x 24". Signups start at the May guild meeting. **Class fee is \$50 for members, \$60 for everyone else. Optional pattern fee \$10 day of workshop.**

## 2018-03 Findings March

**1. I love the movement in this quilt!**

A limited palette. Simple Broken Dishes blocks alternating with string blocks. Varying the angles of the strings makes all the difference. She credited Beth for the idea:

**2. WW BOM I have only a photo this month, but I've written instructions for you. On this post, scroll about half way down to find a Quilt of Valor top made by quilters in Eastern Missouri:**

It alternates 16-patch blocks with what I'll call half-square-in-a-square blocks (only two corners lopped off). The blocks probably finish to 8". For the 16-patches, cut 2.5" squares of red, white and blue. Alternate white squares with reds and blues. It would be easy to piece the blocks from 2.5" strips, sew 4 strips lengthwise and slice into 2.5" sections. For the half-square-in-a-squares, cut 8.5" squares of white, and cut 4.5" squares of red and blue to make triangle corners on two diagonally opposite corners of the white squares. You'll get some largish scraps from those blocks, but you can sew an extra line of stitching and get HSTs to "reserve for another use," as recipes say. Set all the 16-patch blocks with a white square at the upper left, and all the half-square-in-a-squares with their triangles at lower left and upper right. Make 30 of each kind of block, set 6 x 10, to get a quilt 48" x 80". They think the pattern is called Road to St. Louis; I think not!

**PHILANTHROPY NOMINATIONS – MAY VOTING.** Thank you to those of you who nominated charities for our Philanthropy donations this year. We will vote on these at our May Guild meeting. Following are the charities, including a description of each and the person nominating the charity in case you have questions.

### **The Cancer Support Community – Redondo Beach** – Nominated by Pam Overton

Cancer Support Community – Redondo Beach offers a free program for cancer patients and their families and loved-ones. Our goal is to help as many cancer patients as possible recover from the physical and emotional effects of cancer to the greatest extent possible. Our psychological support and educational programs are designed to address the loss of control, hopelessness and social isolation that cancer patients and their families often experience.

### **Chemocessories** – Nominated by Nancy Jengo

The team at Chemocessories believes it is very important to help women feel positive, and that treatment in no way diminishes the beautiful woman within. By putting together sets of scarves, turbans and jewelry and donating them to women going through treatment, Chemocessories can help lift spirits, boost confidence and help provide a smile.

### **House of Yahweh** – Nominated by Pam Overton

The mission of the House of Yahweh (HOY) is to serve the economically exploited and the impoverished, especially women and children, so they can attain greater fullness of life. To accomplish this end, HOY commits to provide food, clothing, shelter, and other supportive services to these people and to direct and guide them along the path to independence.

### **Lawndale Council PTA Christmas Baskets** – Nominated by Charmaine Doty

The Lawndale Christmas Baskets gives out over 300 boxes of food to over 100 families. Each family gets canned goods, fresh fruit and vegetables, turkeys, eggs and other items. We also have about 25 seniors that receive food, with chicken, vegetables, fruit and gifts. There are over 375 children each year that we help. The children receive several new toys. Some parents have told us that these are the only toys the children will get for Christmas. Some families live in motels and some are homeless. With your help we can keep giving happiness to families

### ***Nadine Kirk & Jenifer Briggs***

#### **Presentation Sisters/Presentation Learning Center** – Nominated by Denise LaBorde

The Presentation Learning Center is an educational project of the Presentation Sisters, serving primarily the Spanish-speaking women and men of the Watts area in Los Angeles. The mission of the Center is to provide a caring community where adults, many of whom are immigrants and transitioning into a new culture, can participate in the educational opportunities available in their neighborhood. Goals include building community, increasing literacy, empowering students to acquire employment or better jobs, promoting family communications, improving family health care, and promoting self-esteem. Classes are offered in the morning and evening, babysitting is offered (including teaching English to the children), weekly gatherings are held for senior citizens and educational fieldtrips are offered twice a year.

#### **San Pedro Packages for Patriots** – Nominated by Vivian Ruddy

Mike Walker and his wife Shirley send care packages to our troops deployed to Afghanistan and Iraq. Since June 2008 they have sent 14,835 packages totaling 186,835 lbs. That's 93 tons! Our donation would be used for mailing costs.

#### **South Bay Cats** - Nominated by Vivian Ruddy

South Bay Cats is an all-volunteer organization that rescues cats in the South Bay. They feed feral cats, foster rescued cats and hold weekly adoption events for cats and kittens that are adoptable. Our donation would go for food and veterinary services.

#### **St. Francis Outreach Scholarship Fund** – Nominated by Ann Wallace

The St. Francis Outreach Scholarship Fund was established in 1998 to support worthy students of limited financial means to realize their dreams of a college education, often filling in the gap between grants and other scholarships and by continually giving very personal one-on-one mentoring and encouragement to those students throughout their college years. It also often includes assistance as humble as a lap top computer or rummage-sale purchases to furnish an apartment. Currently the Fund is assisting Katherine at Cal State Bakersfield, Veronica at Pierce College, Jackeline at El Camino and Jenny at Cal State Northridge. May each of their dreams be fulfilled.

#### **Toberman Neighborhood Center** – Nominated by Rosemary Zettler

*Toberman Neighborhood Center* is a non-profit, community-based organization committed to assisting Harbor Area families and individuals by delivering life-changing services that encourage, inform, educate and empower them to live healthy and purposeful lives. It includes an After-School Academy that serves 120 children, a Family Source Center which provides support and education for the whole family (whatever its makeup) and a much respected and very successful Gang Intervention program. I've been involved at Toberman for over forty years, both as a hands-on volunteer and through financial support. They do one dandy job!

The **ANNUAL DCFS PARTY** was a huge success. Thank you one and all for your generous donations! You continue to amaze us with your generosity to others!
