What's happening in Workshops?

Our November workshop with Nadine Kirk "String Pieced Stockings" is almost full, and we are really looking forward to Nadine's class. See the paragraph just below here for a description and plan to join us if you can break away the day before Thanksgiving. Remember this workshop is free if you make a stocking for the guild's community outreach, and we have LOTS of holiday fabric to get you going. Come to the workshop table at guild if you want to sign up for any of our upcoming classes and see the beautiful samples. Remember that you must pay when you register. We take cash, checks or credit cards (at Guild only). All listed workshops will be held at the Palos Verdes Library Community Room (except May 2019). Directions will be furnished to workshop attendees. Call or email Sue Glass if you have questions about any of our upcoming workshops.



November 21, 2018 – Nadine Kirk "String Pieced Stockings" We don't usually have a workshop in November, but our own Nadine Kirk has agreed to teach this class. The deal is that if you make a stocking for Community Services, you get to take this workshop free! If you prefer to work on your own project, that's fine too, but in that case, the workshop will be \$10.00.



January 16, 2019 – Jaime Davis "Beginning Baltimore: Hand Applique." This class is a great introduction to Baltimore Album Quilt making. You will learn the basics of beginning appliqué as well as some dimensional techniques. The focus is on the freezer-paper-on-the-bottom method of appliqué, but this class can also be adapted to include advanced students and other applique methods. \$50 for SBQG/\$60 for others. **Note: this class does not conflict with Road to California (Road 2019 is Jan 24-27)**



March 20, 2019 – Becky McDaniel, "Crazy Cushion"
This project is paper pieced with 3 different pattern designs: Star Jasmine, Pineapple (Not showing) and Flying Geese. It has a zipper and strap for carrying to wherever you need to have a cushion! The finished size is 16"x16"x3". \$50 for SBQG/\$60 for others.



April 18 2019 – Karen Gloeggler "The Jane Austen Inspired Quilt"
Austen fan and avid quilter Karen Gloeggler went to England to see firsthand the only quilt known to have been made by the popular novelist. Karen's workshop will focus on precision piecing and creation of your own version of this beautiful quilt. \$50 for SBQG/\$60 for others.

May 21/22, 2019 – Karen Kay Buckley
(Nakano Theater, Torrance Cultural Arts Center)



May 21st "Fiesta Mexico Block Three with Border"- Hand Applique
(This class is the same day as our May guild meeting.)

May 22nd "Circles Squared"- Machine Applique
The fee is \$65 per class for SBQG/\$75 for others. There is also a kit fee for each class. NOTE: We are taking names of nonmembers for the wait list now. We will fill any open slots from this list in February.

Community Service – Nadine Kirk and Jenifer Briggs

We are continuing to work on quilts for the Quilter's Sew-ciety of Redding, Inc., for the survivors of the Carr Fire. The community lost 1,079 homes and their guild's goal is to provide a quilt (lap size or larger) to at least each household. Quilts can be for children or adults, and pillowcases are welcome too. The Redding guild is collecting fabric, batting and thread, as well as completed quilts.

Please note that there is a volunteer who will be delivering quilts to the Redding area in late November, so please bring any finished quilts or pillowcases to the November Guild meeting.

Here is an update on the quilts in process from the batik fabric scraps that were donated by Private Source Quilting:

- **Batik Strip Sets:** Another big thank-you to everyone who has turned in sewn strip sets. We have six (6) quilts out for quilting, with two more ready to be quilted and two in process. Please return sewn strip sets at the November Guild meeting. This will be an on-going project, and we will make as many quilts as we can from the blocks and leftover pieces that are cut from the strip sets. A big thank you to Melanie Dreike for assembling the blocks into quilt tops!
- **Batik Disappearing 4-Patch Blocks:** Thanks again to those who returned completed disappearing 4-patch blocks. Thanks to Melanie, we have one quilt out for quilting, with another ready to go. For those who have kits, please return them at the November Guild meeting; note that the tutorial is also available on the Guild website.

There is still a need for quilts for the survivors of the Santa Rosa and Thomas (Ventura) fires and mudslides. You may continue to support the fire survivors by directly contacting:

As of mid-September over 1,057 quilts had been logged into their system; some photos are posted at venturamodernquiltguild.com/thomasfire.

DAYS FOR GIRLS. Our Guild member Bea Savellano provided information regarding Days for Girls, a very worthy organization founded in Kenya in 2008 that provides kits and menstrual health education for women all over the world (now one million girls and women in 116 countries). Many women and girls are restricted in their lives because they have no way of managing their menstrual cycle. In our area there are groups making kits in Irvine and West LA, and an informal group in Hermosa Beach. The kit costs \$4 to make and includes 10 washable pads made of flannel, 2 snap in shields and a bag. Check it out: www.daysforgirls.org -- and there is a TEDx talk, Celeste Mergens at TEDxBellingham.

We also have fabric for Wounded Warrior quilts, backs for WW quilts, and batting available. Please let Arlene Zobrist, Nadine Kirk or Jenifer Briggs know if you need batting for a WW or RMAQ.

Last, please contact Nadine or Jenifer with any questions, and thank you again for all that you do to help those in need, your work makes a difference!

I'm often asked about putting a label on our quilts, and I encourage quilters to put their own label on the quilt, with any message you may want to send, giving it a personal touch. I enclose a thank you letter from the Guild, along with a self-addressed note if they want to stay in touch.

Please remember our military as you get ready for the holidays. It's a lonely time for those deployed and away from their loved ones, and any gift or message helps bring them some cheer.



Requirements:

Size: 48" by 78" (stretcher size)

All cotton (including batting, 80/20 acceptable)

Appropriate patriotic theme/design

Optional: Pillowcase, 20"x30", coordinating fabric



Read Me a Quilt- Julie Maas

Another wonderful group of quilts and books were turned in at the October Guild meeting from: Trudy Ooms (quilt and book), Pat Bryan (2 quilts and books), Denise LaBorde (quilt and book, quilted by Kellie Rollo Fireman), Karen Rakita (quilt, pillowcase, fabric box and book), Sharon Amos (2 quilts and books), Jane Pavlina (2 quilts and books), and Nadine Kirk (3 quilts and books). Many thanks to all of you; the CASA staff and the foster children that they support will be very happy to see them. We received a lovely thank-you note from the CASA who assisted the 17-year old girl now on her way to college, for whom we made the requested "camouflage" quilt, letting us know that the recipient was thrilled and loved the quilt.

Please don't hesitate to utilize the books that are available for you to donate with your quilt; a list of these books is posted on the Guild website. There is also a list of suggested books for older children to inspire you. As a reminder, the CASA system assists children from very young ages to young people up to 21 years old, who need bed quilts to brighten their living areas as they get ready to transition out of the system and be on their own. Quilts don't need to be elaborate, and suggested sizes are from 40 x 50-60 for younger children, up through generous lap sizes/twins.

Month after month, year after year, Sweatshop participants tend to be the same several, dedicated people. I know an additional Tuesday night for SBQG projects might not be that tempting. It's dark out, you might still be recovering from all that weekend partying—whatever. How about this—let's try something new. There are several jobs you can do at home. They don't take long—you might not even have to change the thread already in your machine:

1. Process ten quilts. Close, label and sew around, creating a half-inch faux binding look. Super easy, you can work in small chunks of time.
2. Accept a box of 6.5" strips to cut into 6.5" squares.
3. Accept a box of folded fabric, ready to cut into 6.5" strips and/or squares, your choice.
4. Volunteer to deliver bundles of quilts to their final destinations.
5. Request ten pinned quilt "sandwiches" with instructions for sewing around, trimming and turning.
6. Forgot to pick up kits at the meeting? I'll deliver ten kits to you, instructions included. Assemble them at your leisure—there are no deadlines.

Call me, 310.612.4180 (talk/text), or email mshadbourne@socal.rr.com and let me know how you'd like to help. I will be happy to deliver a project to you, and to pick it up when you're finished. We can do this! The Comfort Project Needs You!

November Findings by Dottie Daybell

We were very lucky, and got through Hurricane Florence with no major damage to my house or my daughter's. Some of our neighbors had huge trees fall on their houses, or were flooded. Two to three feet of rain fell over just a few days.

1. Do you need a turkey for your Thanksgiving table? Here are some patterns, both pieced and applique:

2. WW BOM Make a Fence Rail Star quilt, using 2.5" strips of red and blue, with white for the star points. Here's the video from Jenny Doan:

The star blocks finish at 18" square. You can set the blocks 2 x 4, and add a 2" finished sashing and a 4" finished border, to get a 46" x 86" quilt. If you left the borders off the ends, you'd get a 78" length. You can scale it down by using 2" cut strips and 3" white squares. The blocks would finish to 13.5", and could be set 3 x 5 with 2" sashing and borders, to get 48.5" x 79.5".

3. Jodi Robinson won a big prize at PIQF for her modern quilt with amazing quilting. She is a professional long-arm quilter. Her blog is no longer active; she's moved to Instagram. (I need to include more from Instagram in my browsing; I prefer blogs with their fuller descriptions, but many bloggers are moving to Instagram.) Jodi's work is wonderful, and daunting! Not something I could do. Click on an image to enlarge it, and see the comments.

Acquisitions –We’re closing in on our deadline for entries. Well sort of - the deadline has been extended to the close of the December guild meeting, but that will be here before you know it. As of October 28, we have 37 quilts entered. Surely there are lots more out there. If you haven’t yet completed your application, please take a minute to do that now. Go to <https://tinyurl.com/yaqy4opy> to enter your quilt. Remember, there is no limit to the number of quilts you can enter. For those of you without computer access, we will also have hard copies available at the guild meeting or we’ll be happy to mail you a form or two. Just give one of the team members a call. Complete the form and turn it in to the team at the meeting or you can mail them to Robyn Wilkes at 23222 Elm Avenue, Torrance, CA 90505. Robyn will see that the info is input into our database. Remember, your quilt isn’t officially entered until we have the application and a photo.

Please carefully measure the width and length (don’t guess) and provide those numbers in the correct location on your entry form. Your quilt does not have to be quilted or bound to enter it in the show but knowing the status at quilt entry will help us to follow up with you as to the progress.

If you provide your own photo (digital photos are preferred), please remember to put your smiling face in the photo! That helps us ensure that we have the correct quilt entered for each person. Your photo should be named with your last name and the entry title (e.g., Overton_Wonky Trees) and emailed to SBQGquiltshowentry@gmail.com.

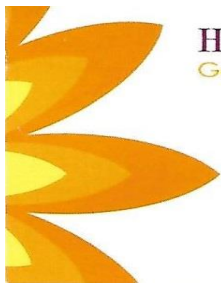
