We would like them 6 1/2” unfinished size. Fabric should be two fabrics. Fabric A: White with black print. Fabric B: Black with white print. This two-fabric block is easy, fast, and fun.

Community Services – Nadine Kirk & Jennifer Briggs

We would like to thank all of the Guild members who have participated in Community Service projects during the last Guild year. Community Service is the umbrella for the Guild charity and philanthropy projects and committees, which include the Comfort Quilt Project, Read Me a Quilt (for foster children in the CASA program), Wounded Warriors, Los Angeles Department of Children & Family Services (DCFS), and Disaster Survivor quilts. It has been an honor, and a lot of fun, to chair Community Services for the last two years. We appreciate all of your help!

Fire Survivors: It was a busy year to help the fire survivors. From the batik strips that were donated by Private Source Quilting, we delivered twelve completed quilts (six to Honey Run Quilters in Chico for the Paradise/Camp fire survivors, two to The Quilter’s Sew-ciety of Redding, Inc. for the Redding/Carr fire survivors, and four to the Santa Monica/Malibu School District for the Woolsey/Malibu fire survivors). We also received and donated quilts and afghans; again, many thanks to everyone.

Current projects:

- We will have more pillowcase kits available, and will continue to collect completed pillowcases at the June Guild meeting, to be sent to fire survivors and first responders. A link to a tutorial video to make pillowcases using the “hot dog/roll up method” is posted on the Members Only/Community Services page on the Guild website (You Tube, The Crafty Gemini, “How to make a Pillowcase- Burrito/Sausage/Roll Up Method”. <https://youtu.be/TAomYjHzUQk>)
- We will have more kits of flannel strips to make baby quilts available at the June Guild meeting; there is no time limit on when these quilts can be completed and turned in for DCFS.
- We have fabric available for Wounded Warrior quilts, backs for WW quilts, firefighter-themed fabric, and batting available. Please let Arlene Zobrist, Nadine Kirk or Jenifer Briggs know if you need batting for a WW quilt.

Requirements:

Size: 48" by 78" (stretcher size)

All cotton (including batting, 80/20 acceptable)

Appropriate patriotic theme/design

Optional: Pillowcase, 20"x30", coordinating fabric

Many thanks to our members who turned in eight lovely quilts and books at the May Guild meeting: Bonnie Tigner (2 quilts, books and pillowcases), Lucia Petrarca (4 quilts and books), Jane Pavlina (1 quilt and book), and Gloria Gould (1 quilt and book). The quilts will be much appreciated by CASA and the foster children in the program.

CASA's clients include a range from very young children to those up to the age of 21. Suggested sizes for quilts range from 40 x 60 (large enough for children to wrap around themselves), to lap/twin size for those who are older and getting ready to live on their own. Most of the current referrals CASA is receiving are for older children, so the need is greatest in that area. Pillowcases are also welcome, especially for the older children. We will update everyone with any changes in CASA's needs.

For anyone who is looking for inspiration for a book to donate with a quilt, please check the Guild website (Community Services) for a list of donated books that we have available for you to donate with your quilt. The Guild website also includes a list of books that are suitable for the older children in the program (middle school, high school and young adult). We will be happy to bring any of the books to a Guild meeting for you to take home.

We have batting available, as well as a limited number of bolts of fabric available for backing fabric. Last, please note that we are posting a label template on the Guild website, if you would like to print your own RMAQ labels on prepared, printer-ready fabric.

Thank you for your continued hard work, generosity and support of CASA/RMAQ. The gift of a warm quilt, and a book to curl up with, is invaluable for the foster children in the CASA program.

2. WW BOM This simple pattern uses two sizes of HSTs. I'm going to be lazy and leave the block size and layout up to you! An 8" block would use 4" finished HSTs, 2" finished HSTs and 2" squares. A 12" block would change those numbers to 6" and 3" finished.

Pattern is courtesy of 32 Modern Quilt Blocks Publication.

Guidelines: Two fabrics. Fabric A: White with black print.

Fabric B: Black with white print.

This two-fabric block is easy, fast, and fun. Please make more than one since they are small. Setting these blocks should be interesting and modern, maybe including some plain blocks.

Cutting Out

Fabric A: Three (3) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ " (You may want to use 7" for squaring to $6\frac{1}{2}$ ")

Fabric B: Two (2) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ " (Same comment as above)

and Two (2) 1 " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ " (Same comment as above)

Construction

*Sew the $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ " strips together in the order ABABA along their long edges.

*Sew one Fabric B 1 " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ " strip to each side of Fabric ABABA unit along their long edges.

* Trim to $6\frac{1}{2}$ " square.
